February Is Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month

According to the <u>Connecticut Coalition Against Domestic Violence</u>, relationships exist on a spectrum, from healthy to unhealthy to abusive. The most important thing to remember is that love should never hurt, either physically or emotionally, and that you have the right to feel safe and good about yourself. Unhealthy relationships can start early and last a lifetime. Teen dating violence can start with teasing and name calling,

January is Human Trafficking* Prevention Month. In recognition, Project SAGE staff participated in <u>Blue Campaign</u>'s annual #WearBlueDay initiative on January 11. According to Human Trafficking Officer Malik B., "Programs like Wear Blue Day raise public awareness. This could lead to more eyes and ears on the street in areas law enforcement wouldn't normally have immediate access to." *Human trafficking occurs when a trafficker uses force, fraud, or coercion to control another person for the purpose of engaging in commercial sex acts or soliciting labor or services against his/her will. Force, fraud, or coercion need not be present if the individual engaging in commercial sex is under 18 years of age.
