It's That Time Of Year!

Thanks to our incredible community of supporters, Women's Support Services has helped more clients this year than ever before! Our Advocates answered nearly 1500 crisis calls, assisted 821 clients, and stood by 670 clients at court - a more than 20% increase in each of these areas over last year. We have also expanded our options for emergency shelter and helped 10 adults and 6 children through our interim housing initiative that was launched last year. As we assist clients in finding permanent homes, your support - whether through direct donations, gas cards and gift cards from Stop n' Shop, Target and Wal-Mart, or our Client Wish List at Bed, Bath & Beyond - can make all the difference. Thank you!

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Our fall session of certification training wrapped up on November 17, and WSS is delighted to welcome 7 new volunteers to our ranks. Along with two long-standing volunteers who re-certified as part of the fall cohort, that brings the total number of active volunteers to more than 30 -- and we appreciate every single one! WSS volunteers contribute to our mission of ending interpersonal relationship violence in so many ways: driving clients to appointments, setting up shelter for new residents, reading in our Early Years PreK-Grade 2 program, staffing the crisis hotline, representing WSS at local fairs and events, assisting with outreach mailings, and much, much more. We truly could not do all that we do without the support of our dedicated volunteers.



Those who complete the training become certified Domestic Violence Crisis Counselors under WSS supervision. - **Report:** The Lethality Assessment Program is a specialized risk assessment tool utilized by police during incidents of intimate partner violence that determines the survivor's risk of fatal violence and immediately connects those in high danger situations with an advocate at one of CCADV's 18 member organizations, including WSS. In the 10 years since Connecticut's LAP rollout, over 75,000 screens have been conducted at the scene of an intimate partner violence incident, with 39,806 (53%) of those screens being deemed "high danger," and 23,154 survivors entering services. - Training: On December 7 and again on December 10, Right to Be (formerly Hollaback!) in conjunction with the NYC Commission on Gender Equity and the NYC Mayor's Office to End Domestic Violence presents a free, one-hour training on reducing the prevalence of street harassment as part of the Stand Up program. Designed to help people safely intervene when they experience or witness harassment in public spaces, the goal of Stand Up is to ultimately build a culture where street harassment is seen as unacceptable behavior.
